



ALL PUT OUT; NO PLACE TO GO, BUT GOING!

secretary. James Maurer of Pennsylvania and J. Harriman of Los Angeles were named vice presidents. Crystal Eastman was authorized to pick an organization committee.

Stedman named a nominating committee, which will in turn select a "permanent executive committee," composed of the following:

Dean Lovett was prominently identified with the first "peace" meeting held by these forces in the Auditorium theater in April.

JORDAN DISCLAIMS ACTIVITY.

Minneapolis, Minn., Sept. 1.—A telegram, disclaiming active participation in the peace propaganda of the people's council for America for democracy and peace, was received here today from Dr. David Starr Jordan, president emeritus of Leland Stanford university of California, by his sister, Mrs. Mary J. Edwards of this city. The telegram follows:

COUNCIL CALLED QUICKLY TO BAR PEACE MEETING.

Action Taken 2 Hours Before Governor Issues Order.

Chicago's aldermen lost no time in declaring themselves against pacifist meetings yesterday.

Two hours before Gov. Lowden yesterday issued an order against the proposed peace meetings in Chicago, a call for a special meeting of the council for 11 a. m. Tuesday was issued to adopt resolutions asking the executive to prevent the meetings.

Ald. John Toman prepared the petition for the special meeting. He rounded up several other members of the council, who signed the call. "If these peace advocates can't lan-
