WHAT WOMEN DEMAND.

The Women's Social and Political Union are NOT asking for a vote for every woman, but that the vote shall be given to those women at present disqualified solely on the ground of sex.

It is estimated that when the claim has been conceded, about a million and a-quarter women will possess the vote, in addition to the seven and a-half million men who are at present enfranchised.

MEMBERSHIP.

Women of all shades of political opinion who approve the objects and methods of the Union, and who are prepared to act independently of party, are eligible for membership. It must be clearly understood that no member of the Union shall support the candidate of any political party in Parliamentary elections until women have obtained the Parliamentary Vote. There is an entrance fee of 1s. Women can obtain from the stewards in the hall cards of application for membership.

AT HOMES.

A special invitation is extended to all those interested to attend any of the meetings of the Union. In London weekly At Homes are held every Monday afternoon from 3 to 5, in the Queen's Hall, Langham Place (during May in the Scala Theatre), and every Thursday evening 8 to 10 in the St. James' Hall, Great Portland Street.
